Radicalisation- Children being drawn into terrorism and/or extremist views which could bring themselves or others to harm.	Children and staff and visitors- especially people who find it difficult to make friends • May have an SEN that means it is difficult to interact with other people • May be vulnerable due to family circumstances	-Children are encouraged to share their views and opinions with their peers - All children are given the opportunity to express themselves in a safe and inclusive environment - Expected behaviours are shared and reinforced by staff e.g. sharing, being kind, being helpful, looking after our nursery - We promote British Values through sharing food and drink, the law, respect and tolerance, community, table manners, the world, music and art and special days/ festivals. This is all an integral part of all aspects of the curriculum. Personal Spiritual Moral Cultural education is integrated into the curriculum to promote British Values and the importance of respect, acceptance and understanding diversity. The school has a range of initiatives and activities that promote the spiritual, moral, social and emotional needs of children through both the explicit curriculum and through circle times, celebration days, displays, newsletters - Curriculum teaches children strategies on keeping themselves safe (inc.
